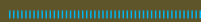

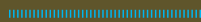

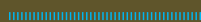

NEXT STEPS

ENROLL AT SEWANEE.

Reserve your spot in the incoming class by submitting your deposit using the Enrollment Confirmation Form on your Applicant Status Page at engage.sewanee.edu/apply/status. This deposit is not an additional charge; it is applied directly to your bill.

LEARN MORE ABOUT WORK OPTIONS.

If federal work-study or a work scholarship is part of your Financial Aid Award, visit admission.sewanee.edu/financial-aid-details to learn more about our student employment programs. You will begin the process this summer on your

PURSUE ADDITIONAL FINANCING OPTIONS.

ACCEPT OR DECLINE YOUR LOAN.

If a Federal Direct Loan is part of your Award, a loan request/decline form is on your Applicant Status Page at engage.sewanee.edu/apply/status.

MAKE A PAYMENT.

New students will receive more information about Sewanee's Student Account Center

(SAC) at mycollegepaymentplan.com/sewanee in early July when your billing statement for Advent Semester will become available. This is where you, or your parents, make tuition payments. Your Advent Semester balance must be paid in full by July 31; your Easter Semester balance must be paid in full by Dec. 31.

OUTCOMES

Whether it's graduate school or a career, the Sewanee Career Center is here to assist you from the very beginning. Not very beginning as in the beginning of your senior year. The very beginning as in at the start of freshman orientation.

And from the very beginning, the Sewanee Career Center staff will encourage you to explore summer internships. Then, they'll tell you how they provide nearly \$600,000 to Sewanee students pursuing unpaid internships each summer. Learn more about the Sewanee Career

The Sewanee Career Center also works with our students after graduation to see how they're faring in the "real world." Here's what they know about the Class of 2020:

- There were 416 graduates in the Class of 2020. We made contact with 87.5 percent of them within six months of graduation.
- 59% were either employed full-time, in the military, or working in internships.

- 15% were in graduate or professional school full-time.
- 7% had received fellowships or are performing volunteer service.
- 13% were working part-time, or seeking employment or graduate programs.
- 4% were both employed and continuing education.

OUR PLEDGE.

Your first official act as a Sewanee student is to sign our Honor Code. By doing so, you are making a two-way promise. - We pledge—to help Sewanee graduates secure top jobs and spots at top graduate programs by providing funding for a summer internship or research opportunity.

- We pledge—to help Sewanee graduates find their place in an increasingly interconnected world by providing you with access to a semester-long study abroad program at no additional tuition cost.
- We pledge—that you will graduate (with one major) in four consecutive years. If you do not, Sewanee will provide up to one additional year of study tuition-free.

Of course, you will have to do your part, too. But if you meet Sewanee's academic and social expectations, we pledge—we guarantee—to make these opportunities available to you.
