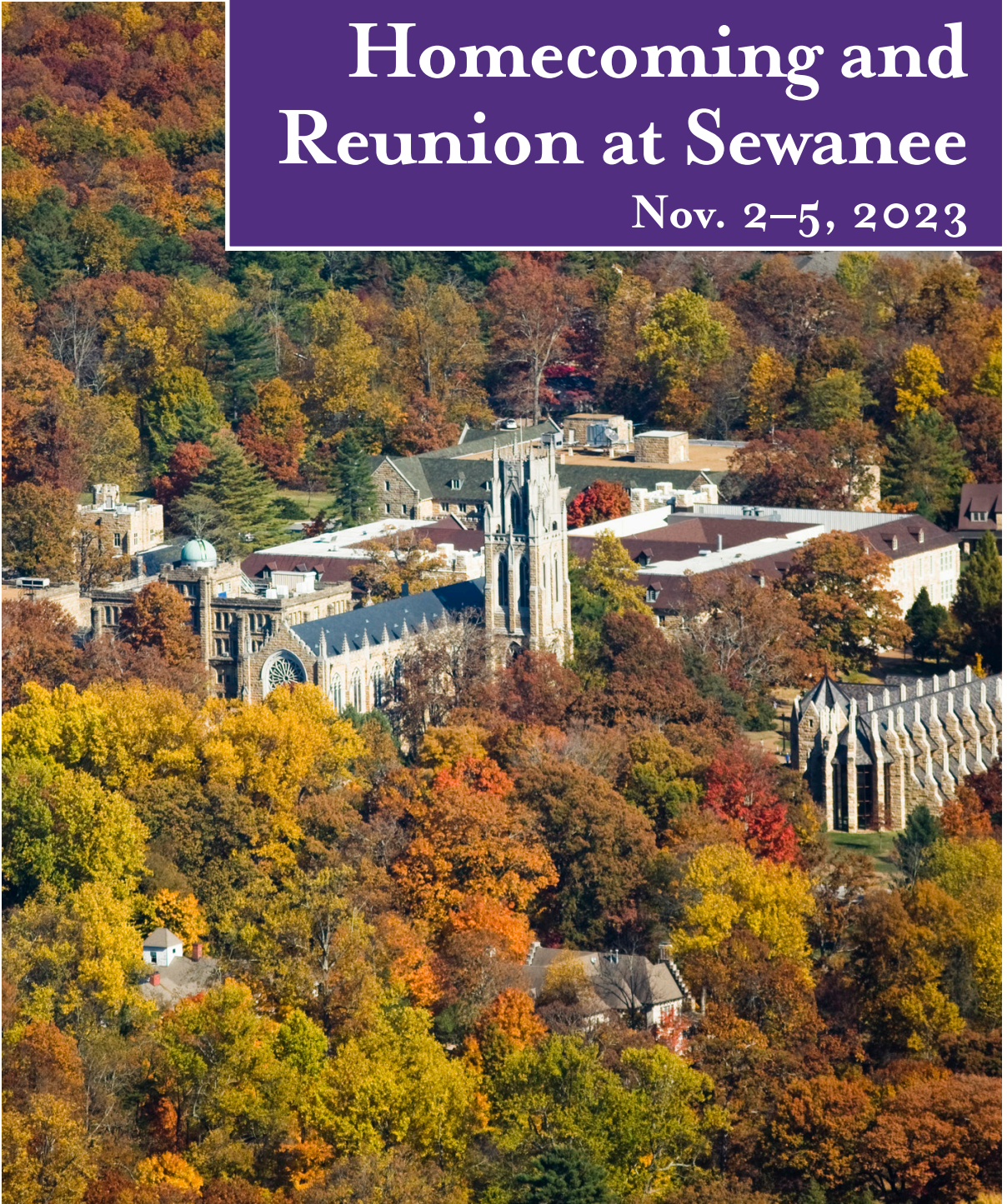

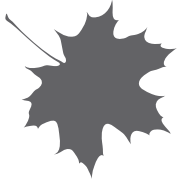

Distinguished Faculty Staff Award

PAIGE SCHNEIDER



This is the highest honor awarded a faculty or staff member by the Associated Alumni. It is given to a member of the faculty or staff who has demonstrated leadership and a sincere interest in the future well-being of the students of the University and has been supportive of the Associated Alumni.

PAIGE SCHNEIDER is not just a scholar and educator but a beacon of inspiration and compassion, leaving an indelible mark on her students at Sewanee. Since earning a Ph.D. in political science from Emory University in 2000, she has dedicated her life to nurturing young minds and fostering a sense of community and empathy among her students. She retired in spring 2023 after 23 years of service.

Beyond her transformative teaching methods, Schneider's dedication to Sewanee shines through her extensive service to the University. Her meticulous reviews for journals such as *Sport in Society*, *Journal of Gender Studies*, *Politics & Gender*, and *Gender & Society* reflect her commitment to maintaining academic rigor within the institution. Her expertise has been sought by publishers including Routledge Press, CQ Press/Sage, and Longman Publishers, showcasing her influence in shaping scholarly discourse.

In addition to her scholarly contributions, Schneider has been an active member of many committees and initiatives at Sewanee. Serving on the College Standards Committee in the 2021-2022 term, she played a crucial role in upholding academic excellence. As the faculty advisor for Pro-Choice Sewanee from 2021 to 2022, she championed students' rights and inclusivity. Her leadership as the secretary of the Sewanee chapter of the American Association of University Professors, and her co-authorship of the Faculty Salary Report/State of the Faculty in 2022 highlighted her dedication to faculty welfare.

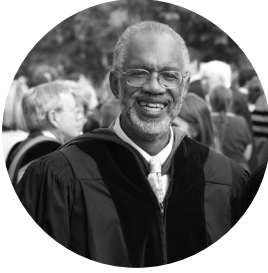
Schneider has also been a driving force behind a number of initiatives promoting diversity and inclusion. Her co-leadership of the Intergroup Dialogue on Race and Class from 2016 to 2018 showcased her commitment to fostering understanding and harmony among students. Serving as a mentor for the Adelante program for Latinx undergraduate students from 2017 to 2019, she provided invaluable support and guidance to underrepresented students, shaping their academic journeys.

Schneider's involvement in the Women's and Gender Studies Steering Committee, the Yale-Sewanee Collaborative for Southern Appalachian Studies, and her role as a faculty liaison from the Women's Studies Program to the Women's Center Board underline her commitment to advancing gender equality and empowering women in academic spaces.

In her role as a faculty advisor for various student organizations, including Beyond Sewanee and the Gender and Sexual Diversity Alliance, she has created a nurturing environment where students can thrive intellectually and emotionally. Her active participation in the Faculty Mentor Program for Students of Color and the First Year Program further exemplifies her dedication to student success from the moment they set foot on campus.

Paige Schneider's impact on Sewanee is immeasurable. Her tireless efforts to create an inclusive, intellectually stimulating, and supportive environment for students and faculty alike have truly shaped the fabric of the University. Her legacy as an educator, mentor, and advocate continues to inspire and uplift the Sewanee community, making her a cherished member of the University's academic family.

Distinguished Faculty Staff Award

ERIC BENJAMIN, C'73

This is the highest honor awarded a faculty or staff member by the Associated Alumni. It is given to a member of the faculty or staff who has demonstrated leadership and a sincere interest in the future well-being of the students of the University and has been supportive of the Associated Alumni.

ERIC BENJAMIN, C'73, was Sewanee's first director of multicultural affairs and first Black chair of the University's Honor Council.

Benjamin, or "Mr. B," as he was affectionately known to generations of students, served the University as a devoted employee for nearly 40 years until his retirement in July 2020.

During his time at Sewanee, Benjamin co-founded the Sewanee Summer Scholars Program, a bridge program for high school students who spent their summers on the Domain strengthening their skills in math, science, personal development, and writing in preparation for college. He also was one of the principal members of the Consortium for High Achievement and Success, an organization that focused on the success and satisfaction of African American and Latino men on college campuses. He coordinated this group with schools including Middlebury, Dartmouth, Colby, Wesleyan, and Williams. He also was instrumental in the creation and ongoing support of Sewanee Praise, the University's gospel choir.

As a student, Benjamin distinguished himself as an English major, a member of Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity, and president of the Sewanee Jazz Society. He was also elected chair of the Honor Council in 1972, the first Black student to serve as the leader of one of the College's three main student government organizations.

As a symbol of his enduring legacy, students, alumni, and friends commissioned an oil portrait of Benjamin that now hangs in the University's library.

In February 2021, as part of the celebration of 55 Years of Black Alumni, to honor Benjamin's contributions, the University announced the formation of the Benjamin Network—an alumni group that seeks to empower, connect, and celebrate Sewanee's Black alumni while supporting the greater Sewanee community.

Distinguished Young Alumni Award

JOE BREW, C'08

The Distinguished Young Alumni Award recognizes individuals who have graduated in the past 15 years, distinguished themselves in their vocation, and demonstrated concern for and service to their community. The award also seeks to recognize continuous dedication to and support of the University.

JOE BREW, C'08, is a visionary leader in the field of healthcare technology, currently serving as the CEO of hyfe.ai, a groundbreaking company based in Gainesville, Florida. With a passion for using cutting-edge technology to revolutionize healthcare, Brew co-founded hyfe.ai in March 2020, where he leads a dedicated team in harnessing the power of artificial intelligence to track coughs. Through its innovative approach, hyfe.ai predicts, manages, and treats respiratory health conditions, making significant strides in the realm of digital health.

Prior to his role at hyfe.ai, Brew honed his expertise as a data scientist at DataBrew, contributing his skills and knowledge for four years. Before that, he served as an epidemiologist at the Florida Department of Health, where he played a vital role in public health initiatives. Brew's global perspective on healthcare was further enriched during his time as a maternal health consultant in Ethiopia and as a health educator in Togo, demonstrating his commitment to making a difference on a global scale.

Brew earned a doctorate from the Barcelona Institute for Global Health, where he focused on transdisciplinary solutions for global health with an emphasis on the economics of malaria. His academic journey also includes a master's in public health (MPH) from the Copenhagen School of Global Health and another MPH from Universidad de Granada, specializing in epidemiology, biostatistics, health promotion, and health management. Brew's passion for education is also evident through his past role as a Spanish teacher at St. Andrew's-Sewanee School, where he shared his knowledge and enthusiasm with his students.

With a wealth of experience, a strong educational background, and a relentless drive to innovate, Joe Brew continues to be a trailblazer at the intersection of technology and healthcare. His work at hyfe.ai and his diverse experiences worldwide underline his dedication to improving the lives of people through innovative solutions and a deep understanding of public health challenges.

Brew and his brother Ben, C'12, used their expertise to serve as the first instructors at Sewanee's DataLab, a summer institute that educates aspiring social changemakers to use data tools to build marketable data analysis skills and frame their growing competence in a context of positive social change.

As an undergraduate at Sewanee, Brew triple majored in economics, French, and Spanish and was inducted into Phi Beta Kappa. He also earned SCAC Academic Honor Roll recognition as a member of the men's track and field and cross-country teams.

At his commencement, Brew received the A.T. Pickering Award as well as the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Award, the top undergraduate award given during commencement, which recognizes excellence of character and service to humanity.

Distinguished Young Alumni Award

ALDEN KNOWLTON, C'08

The Distinguished Young Alumni Award recognizes individuals who have graduated in the past 15 years, distinguished themselves in their vocation, and demonstrated concern for and service to their community. The award also seeks to recognize continuous dedication to and support of the University.

ALDEN KNOWLTON, C'08, is a seasoned professional with an impressive background in political advocacy and legislative affairs. She currently serves as the vice president of legislative affairs at the Mortgage Bankers Association in Washington, D.C. In this role, Knowlton leads lobbying efforts, shaping and executing the association's legislative strategies and policy objectives within the U.S. House of Representatives. She is adept at analyzing complex legislative language and proposing legislation that significantly impacts the real estate finance, banking, and mortgage industries.

Knowlton's expertise extends to managing political budgets, fundraising initiatives, and grassroots lobbying networks. Notably, she has helped set fundraising records and substantially increased membership in grassroots lobbying networks. Knowlton establishes and strengthens relationships with Members of Congress and senior Congressional staff and fosters coalitions among industry participants and consumer advocates to advance the Mortgage Bankers Association's initiatives.

In addition to her work in legislative affairs, she has held significant roles in political advocacy with the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association and other organizations. Knowlton's commitment to political engagement is underscored by her proactive approach in implementing strategic outreach programs, managing fundraising campaigns, and providing in-depth political analysis.

Knowlton's dedication to the field is further demonstrated through her involvement in various initiatives, including the Mortgage Bankers Association's EMBRACE Committee, promoting diversity and inclusion. With a background encompassing roles at organizations including Angerholzer Broz Consulting and Sutter's Mill Fund Raising & Strategy, Knowlton brings a wealth of experience and expertise to the realm of political advocacy. Her passion for political engagement, coupled with her strategic acumen, makes her a driving force in shaping legislative agendas and advancing industry interests.

At Sewanee, Knowlton was a history major and was the winner of the Spirit Award in 2007 and 2008. She was active on campus as a senior interviewer and Arcadian for the Office of Admission, as a member of the women's varsity basketball team, the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, Theta Kappa Phi sorority, the Order of the Gown, the Orientation Committee, and the Student Alumni Leadership Council. As an alumna, she has shared her expertise with students as a participant in the Beyond the Gates career networking program. She has also led her class on the reunion giving committee and as a Sewanee Fund class volunteer.

To recognize long and distinguished service, the Associated Alumni established the John R. Crawford, C'28, Distinguished Alumni Service Award. This award recognizes faithful, dedicated, and long-standing volunteer service to the work of the University and the Associated Alumni.

NORMAN JETMUNDSEN, C'76, and DAVID CREWS, C'76, the dynamic duo behind the award-winning documentary *Unrivaled: Sewanee 1899*, are surprise filmmakers who have brought to life a true story that leaves all lovers of Sewanee full of pride. With a keen eye for detail and an innate ability to weave compelling narratives, the two classmates collaborated on telling the story of the awe-inspiring journey of the Sewanee Iron Men, leaving an indelible mark on the world of sports documentaries. Drawing inspiration from the rich legacy of that undefeated Sewanee football team, the duo skillfully crafted a cinematic masterpiece that resonates with viewers on a profound level. Their work captures the triumphs, challenges, and sheer determination of the student-athletes, shedding light on the unwavering spirit that fueled their pursuit of excellence. Through their collaboration, Jetmundsen and Crews not only brought the Sewanee football story to life but also managed to captivate audiences, earning widespread acclaim and a fantastic reaction from viewers and critics alike.

In 140 years of college football, nothing else has come close to the singular accomplishment of the 1899 Sewanee team. But most Americans don't know this story. Even most Sewanee devotees only vaguely and partially grasp its drama and significance. Jetmundsen and Crews' documentary tells the compelling, historically accurate, and riveting story of the team, the season, and the rare convergence of talent, personalities, and drive that made the 1899 season truly legendary.

The film has enjoyed overwhelming success, and the exposure it has brought to Sewanee is immeasurable. In addition to a tour of live screenings, a partnership with Public Broadcasting Service has ensured that the film has been seen in 90% of television markets nationwide. Among the honors the film has received are an Emmy nomination for the Southeast Region for Best Historical Documentary, first-place honors for Documentary Feature Film at the Knoxville Film Festival, and Best Local Film at the Cobb International Film Festival.

The promotion of Sewanee through the film is a wonderful form of service to the University, and Jetmundsen and Crews have a long history of serving their alma mater. Both have served as volunteers for the Office of Admission, Career Readiness, and the Sewanee Fund. Jetmundsen has also been a member of the Alumni Executive Board and the Board of Trustees.

Jetmundsen's sons Taylor and Nelson graduated from Sewanee in 2016. Crews' daughter Caroline graduated in 2021.

Distinguished Alumnus Award

LINDA MAYES, C'73

The Distinguished Alumnus Award recognizes individuals who have distinguished themselves in their vocation and who have demonstrated concern for and service to their community. Furthermore, the award seeks to recognize individuals who have shown dedication to and support of the University and whose position of stature and importance has brought favorable attention and recognition to the University.

LINDA MAYES, C'73, H'20, is a distinguished figure in the fields of child psychiatry, pediatrics, and psychology, currently holding the title of Arnold Gesell Professor at the Yale Child Study Center. With a solid educational foundation, including a B.A. from Sewanee and an M.D. from Vanderbilt University, Mayes has earned significant recognition, including an honorary doctor of science degree from the University of the South. Currently serving as the director of the Yale Child Study Center and special advisor to the dean of the Yale School of Medicine, she also imparts her extensive knowledge as a distinguished visiting professor of psychology at Sewanee.

Mayes is deeply passionate about her research pursuits, focusing on critical areas such as early adversity, stress regulation, parental addiction, and the neural circuitry of social attachment and parental behavior. Her expertise extends to understanding the risk factors for adolescent drug use and the development of reward systems, delving into the intricate workings of the human mind.

A dedicated educator, Mayes has played a pivotal role in shaping the academic landscape at Sewanee. During the late 1990s, she initiated a summer internship program at the Yale Child Study Center, providing invaluable opportunities for Sewanee students. Over the years, she expanded this program, guiding and mentoring numerous students in ongoing research projects. Additionally, she co-taught an innovative Sewanee course in the Psychology Department—Child, Family, and Community Development in Rural Appalachia—collaborating with Sewanee faculty, Yale visitors, and community partners.

Mayes' impact reaches beyond the classroom, influencing the academic and research landscape through her contributions. Her expertise and dedication have made her an invaluable asset to both Yale University and Sewanee, leaving an enduring mark on the field of psychology and the lives of the students she has inspired.

As an undergraduate at Sewanee, she was a member of the University's first class of women and was the valedictorian and a member of Phi Beta Kappa. She has served Sewanee in countless ways, including as a volunteer for the Office of Admission, and the Beyond the Gates career networking program, as a member of the College Visiting Committee, a career services advisor, a Sewanee Fund class volunteer, on the Stronger Truer Campaign cabinet, and as a member of the Sewanee Health Professions Advisory Board. Mayes was the speaker for the 2020 commencement ceremony at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic. Sewanee Fund Awards

Sewanee Fund Awards recognize classes in a variety of categories. These awards celebrate the reunion classes in the annual fund campaign beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023.

THE HALL TROPHY—Class of 1996

Chairs: Katie Murdock Edwards and Peter Edwards

The Hall Trophy is presented to the class with the the highest increases in giving and participation within a given fiscal year (excluding Exornati alumni classes). The trophy is named in honor of O. Morgan Hall, C'39, T'46. The Class of 1996 had a 6% increase in participation and a \$54,544 increase in dollars raised.

THE HOLLOWAY AWARD—Class of 1977

Chair: Joanne Boyd

The Holloway Ward is presented to the class with the highest non-reunion class participation (excluding Exornati alumni classes). This award is named for Robert A. Holloway Sr., C'36, who led his class to 100 percent participation for over 10 consecutive years. The Class of 1977 was the winner of this award. The class ended up with 51% participation.

THE FAIRBANKS AWARD—Class of 2007

Chair: Emorie Broemel

The Fairbanks Award honors the young alumni class (which graduated in the most recent 15 years) achieving the highest giving participation in a given fiscal year. This award is named in memory of Charles M. Fairbanks, the first University matriculant. The Class of 2007 had 43% alumni participation.

THE JACK STEPHENSON REUNION GIVING AWARD

The Jack Stephenson Reunion Giving Award honors the reunion year class (fifth–50th) that achieves the highest giving participation. This award is named after Jack Stephenson, C'49, who chaired Sewanee's first 50th reunion class giving drive in 1999. The winner will be announced in January 2024. (Gifts for this award will be counted from July 1, 2022 through Dec. 31, 2023)

EXORNATI ALUMNI AWARDS—Class of 1954

The Exornati Alumni Award recognizes the Exornati class (past 50th reunion) achieving the highest increase in giving participation. This year's recipients increased class participation by 17%.
