





Fountain of life and source of all goodness, you made all things and fill them with your blessing; you created them to rejoice in the splendor of your radiance. Countless throngs of angels stand before you to serve you night and day; and, beholding the glory of your presence, they offer you unceasing praise. Joining with them, and giving voice to every creature under heaven, we acclaim you, and glorify your Name, as we sing,

We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation. Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

Remember all your people, and those who seek your truth.

Remember all who have died in the peace of Christ, and those whose faith is known to you alone; bring them into the place of eternal joy and light.



The Rt. Rev. Peter Eaton is the fourth bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Southeast Florida and has served the church in many capacities both stateside and abroad. Eaton was born in Washington, D.C., and raised in New England, Barbados, Puerto Rico, and London. A lifelong Anglican, he is the son, grandson, and nephew of priests, and he has lived and served in three provinces of the Anglican Communion. Eaton read Classics at King's College, London and Theology at Queens' College, Cambridge; and he was trained for the priesthood at Westcott House, Cambridge. Between university and theological college, Eaton served as the pastoral assistant at Saint George's Anglican Church in Paris, France. In 1995 and 2014, Eaton was fellowin-residence at the School of Theology of the University of the South.

Among other activities, Bishop Eaton has been a fellow in the Christian Leadership Initiative at the Hartman Institute in Jerusalem, and he currently serves on the Standing Commission on Ecumenical and Interreligious Relations of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church. He is also a member of the Worship Planning Committee for the Sixth World Conference on Faith and Order in celebration of the I,700th anniversary of the First Council of Nicaea (325 AD), which will be held in October 2025 at Saint Bishoi Monastery in the Wadi El Natrun in Egypt. In addition to his service to the church, Bishop Eaton has edited or contributed to several books and has written numerous articles and book reviews.

Frank Sullivan Logue

The Rt. Rev. Frank Logue is the 11th bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Georgia, with oversight of the 68 Episcopal congregations in central and south Georgia. Prior to his election in 2020, Logue served 10 years as the canon to the ordinary to the 10th bishop of Georgia. From 2000–2010, Logue served as the church planter for King of Peace Episcopal Church in Kingsland, Georgia. He has also served the Episcopal Church at the churchwide level as a member of the Executive Council. A graduate of the Virginia Theological Seminary, Logue and his wife, Victoria, wrote seven books on the outdoors and travel before he responded to a deeply felt call to serve God in ordained ministry.

DANIEL PAUL RICHARDS

The Rt. Rev. Daniel Paul Richards is the ninth bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Upper South Carolina and an active leader in the church. Richards was born in Cleveland, Mississippi, and raised in Mississippi and Tennessee before moving with his family to Phoenix, Arizona, during high school. In 1994, he graduated summa cum laude from Grand Canyon University with a ministry degree and was ordained as a Southern Baptist minister in 1996. In 1997, Richards answered a call from the Episcopal Diocese of Arizona as the youth and young adult coordinator and was confirmed as an Episcopalian later the same year. Richards attended seminary at the Church Divinity School of the Pacific in Berkeley, California, and was ordained to both the diaconate and priesthood in 2003.

After serving as curate at St. Michael & All Angels in Tucson, Arizona, and at the Church of the Holy Spirit in Phoenix, Richards accepted a call to Grace Episcopal Church in Traverse City, Michigan, in 2009. There he served on local interdenominational and inter-religious boards and continued the parish's longstanding commitment to supporting the homeless and underserved.

In 2015, Richards returned to Arizona as rector of Christ Church of the Ascension, Paradise Valley, and was later elected to lead the East Phoenix Deanery. He also served as president of the board of Chapel Rock Camp and Conference Center in Prescott, Arizona, and volunteered as chaplain for the Phoenix Fire Department from 2018 to 2021.
